Clay Moulds

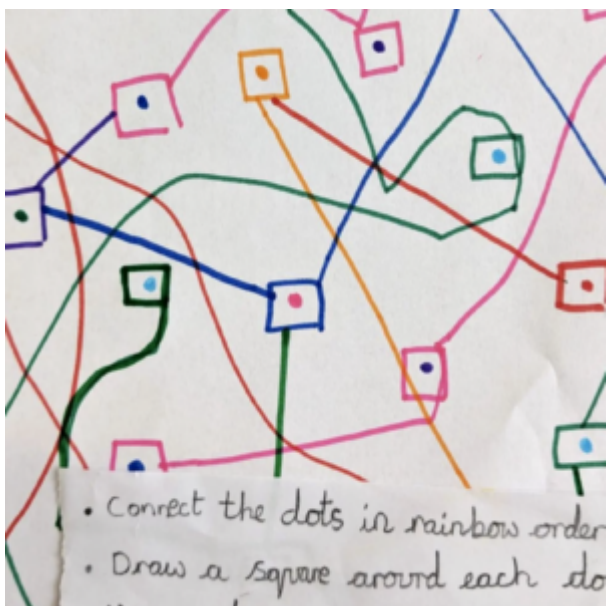
