She has many roles and that currently includes the joyful role of being a Trustee of AccessArt. Some

other roles are: Vice President of InSEA (International Society of Education through Art, the official UNESCO organisation for visual art education globally), Chair of governors Brighton Avenue Primary School, Secretary to the All Party Parliamentary Group on Art Craft Design Education, founder of NEATEN North East Art Teacher Educator Network, honorary fellow of NSEAD popular keynote speaker, visiting Professor University of Sunderland, member of several Arts advisory boards, networker, critical friend, and champion and activist for art education.

Susan also helped set up Sketchbook Circle and takes part in this annual artist teacher exchange every year. She has often said that “art gave me my voice” and it has.

She started her teacher training and career at the Institute of Education in Singapore. She continued her teaching career and education when she moved to Liverpool in the eighties, gaining her Post Graduate in Education from University of Liverpool and Diploma in Education from the University of Manchester. Her first headship was in St Helens in

2004, followed by a second in Cambridge in 2010. Since retiring in 2020, Anne became a governor in a primary school.

Although her degree is in Mathematics and the Arts do not feature prominently in her personal education, she has championed Arts education in the schools she taught in. She saw how children's lives could be transformed (and their outlook broadened) through the Arts, with children growing in confidence and self-esteem and, crucially, taking an active part in their own learning.

She ensured high quality arts provision in the schools she taught in by skilling the teachers through a comprehensive professional development programme. The opportunities and learning experiences in Art were continually monitored and evaluated. This included working closely with several external organisations, such as Museums, Art Galleries, Theatres and Orchestras. Engagement in local and national projects, such as 'Take One Picture', Heritage Project and Artsmark further deepened the children's understanding and developed their skills. She has always found it rewarding to see excitement for learning as the children's cultural capital develops.

Outside the classroom, Anne likes travel, hiking, history and drama.
