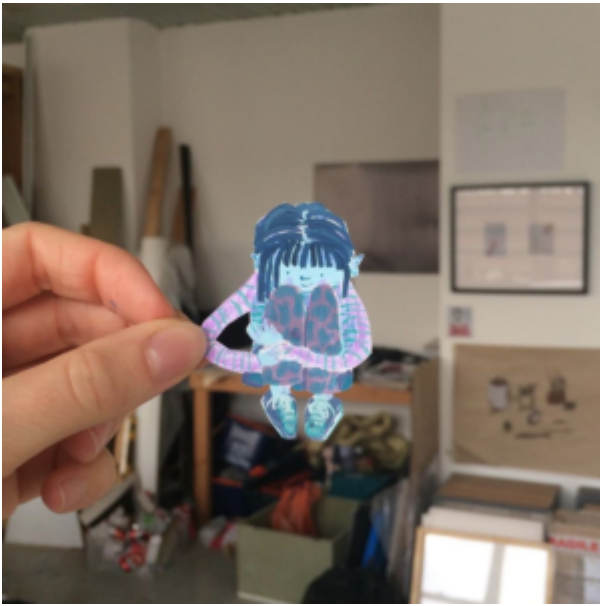
What We Like About This Resource...

We like the way Natsko shares how her experience over time informs her work. Design Lab: Phoebe Cummings at the V&A

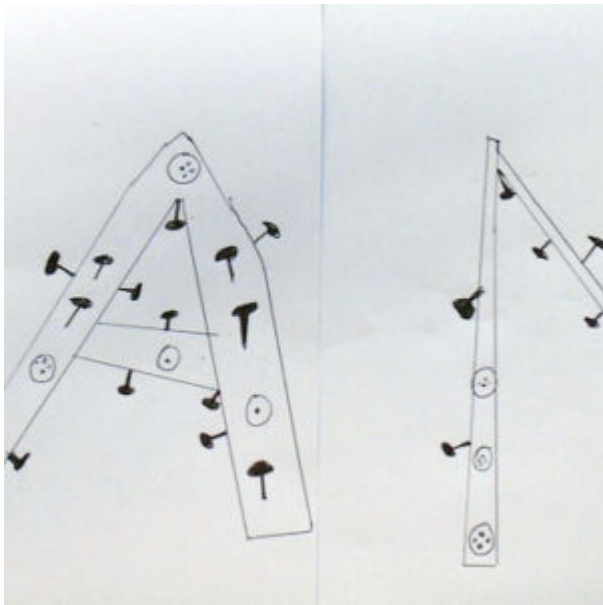

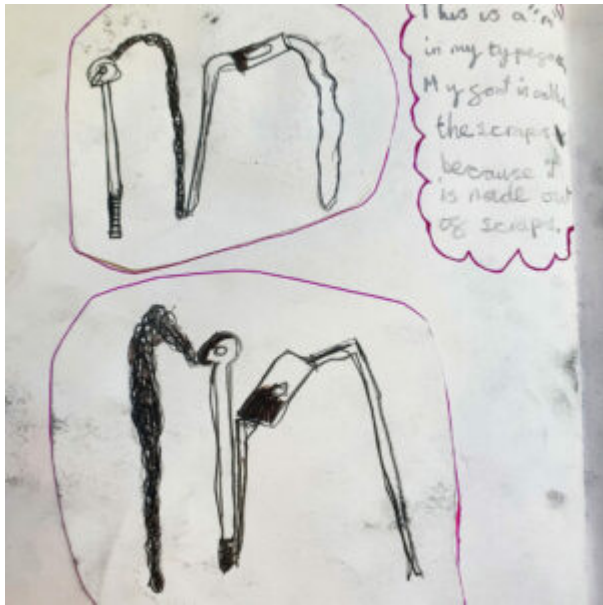

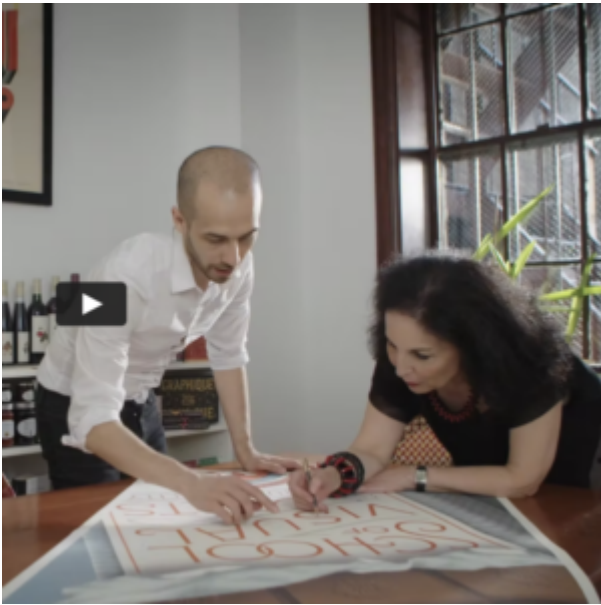
